## **Part I. Guiding Principles**

#### **A. Introduction**

Unprecedented times. It is the phrase we've seen and heard again and again in 2020. In creating a reopening focus group of administrators, teachers, parents, and medical professionals, we have talked through varied scenarios of these unprecedented times as thoroughly as possible and created the handbook that follows in order to communicate these decisions to our school community. In the policies that follow you will see a commitment to the following principles:

- 1. A commitment to the mission of Kehoe-France School in all health and safety protocols, as well as in all models of teaching and learning.
- 2. Policies that are research-based, clearly communicated, and effectively implemented.
- 3. A prioritization of the health, safety, and well-being of students and staff.
- 4. A prioritization of in-person instruction, whenever safely possible, over at-home/distance learning.
- 5. A balanced approach to risk assessment that is underscored by the focus on in-person instruction, as well as the health and safety of our students and staff.

Our Reopening Focus Group has worked together over many hours to create four potential plans for the school in response to the different phases of our community. Given our entanglement with the situation of our communities, Kehoe-France is prepared to toggle between plans as necessary. Additionally, in the interest of streamlined and consistent communication, this Handbook shall serve as the guide for both staff and families. COVID-19 has proven to be a very fluid situation and we expect this to continue into the 2020-2021 school year. Therefore, while we will remain committed to plans as much as possible and for the sake of continuity of learning for our students, we must all be prepared to remain flexible. Kehoe-France also reserves the right to change the policies outlined below as necessary, based on updated health and safety information and the guidance of medical professionals.

#### **B. Mission Focused**

The mission of Kehoe-France is to give each student a strong academic foundation, promote social skills and physical well-being, and nurture cultural and ethical development in a caring and aesthetically pleasing environment.

We remain committed to this mission through the course of this pandemic and global crisis. We recognize that a commitment to this mission at this time extends beyond the walls of the Kehoe-France school buildings and must include consideration for all members of our school community.

We use our school mission at this time to orient us during these challenging times. It allows us to focus on the priorities of this community, cut through the distractions, and make difficult decisions. Our mission reminds us of the connection we all have to one another in this school community, and the reciprocal obligations to one another.

#### **C. Kehoe-France Community Commitments**

In carrying forward with our discussion of our commitment to the school mission, we feel it important to make a statement as well regarding social responsibility and the rights and responsibilities of each member of our school community during this situation, and always.

The procedures and protocols to follow in this document have been created with the utmost care and thought for the health, safety, and development of our students, staff, and teachers. In opening the doors of Kehoe-France, we acknowledge that there will be risks involved with the 2020-2021 school year. It is our intention, however, to make every effort and take every reasonable precaution to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 to the maximum extent possible.

In establishing this "new normal" we recognize that each person's risk tolerance can look very different from others. We also recognize that a certain level of inconvenience will be faced based on the need for certain protocols. Kehoe-France has always been, and will always be, a place where many perspectives can come together for the greater good of our students and school community. Therefore, we expect our respect for one another and sense of duty to this community to be visible in a myriad of ways, including the following:

Complying willingly with rules and policies designed to keep our community safe and healthy Interacting with one another in and out of school in ways that demonstrate a responsibility for prioritizing and maintaining a healthy school environment for all Remaining transparent with screening guidelines upon entry to campus, as well as with quarantining policies put into place by the school or CDC

While this is certainly not the school opening that any of us would prefer, it is also a time for our community to truly pioneer through these challenges with mutual respect, trust, and care for one another. It is truly an opportunity for us to come out stronger on the other side, and we expect to do just that.

#### **Virtual Learning:**

Students can select this option for a quarter by completing the survey sent by Kehoe-France School. This is a commitment for the quarter, and students cannot move in and out of virtual learning during a quarter. Families will be surveyed each quarter, however, to opt into virtual learning or in-school instruction. More information regarding the educational delivery and expectations are outlined in the Teaching & Learning section of this Handbook and in subsequent information to be shared with families who have selected this option for the first quarter.

### **B.** Communication

- Our Head of School, Dr. Tanya Price, will send all official communications regarding the closure of Kehoe-France.
- For any student selecting in-person instruction during any quarter of the school year, the family will need to have a signed COVID-19 waiver on file in the front office prior to their start in school. Dr. Price will send the waiver to families selecting this option.
- Families need to make sure they are receiving calls from our One Call phone service, as well as e-mails from Kehoe-France. Contact the front office immediately at office@kehoe-france.com or (504) 733-0472 if communication is not being received.
- Additionally, division principals Sarah Block and Sarah Ficarra will be responsible for communicating specific details of any plan via e-mail and weekly newsletter with all families of their divisions.

Staff Attendance & Safety	<ul> <li>Kehoe-France will keep an updated sub list available to teachers as needed.</li> <li>Substitute teachers must adhere to the same protocols as all other school staff.</li> <li>Kehoe-France is revising their staff attendance policy based on the potential need to quarantine.</li> <li>Teachers form teams with their same-age group teachers or with a selected partner in 5th-7th grade to share all curricular content and lesson materials, in order to maintain continuity of learning in the event of an unexpected absence or extended illness.</li> <li>For staff safety, Kehoe-France will adhere to social distancing and face mask guidelines for all staff meetings. Whenever possible, meetings will be scheduled as virtual events s as to minimize exposures across multiple groups.</li> <li>Parent teacher conferences and meetings will be scheduled virtually in order to minimiz exposures for all parties involved.</li> </ul>					
Campus Access	<ul> <li>In order to minimize exposures for staff and students, we must limit additional visitors campus.</li> <li>Delivery drivers and maintenance persons will be considered essential personnel. These individuals must adhere to our health and safety protocols including but not limited to, wearing a face covering while on campus, practicing proper hand hygiene, and maintaining appropriate social distance. These individuals will be escorted to the appropriate area on campus by school staff and largely kept from student areas.</li> <li>Therapists who maintain the health and safety protocols outlined above, and who sign a school handbooks will be permitted on campus to work in isolation with students on his/her caseload. Rooms on campus have been designated for this work and these room will be cleaned routinely between student use.</li> <li>Unfortunately, parents and other visitors will not be able to enter campus during these plans. Parent meetings can be scheduled with school staff virtually with the use of Google Meet or Zoom. In Plan C, if there is a prolonged period of time in Phase 3 for the community, school administration will determine when it is appropriate to allow a more open-door policy once again. It is not our intention to close out our families in any way, and we will be looking for ideas to bring our families and community together. We will find ways to safely celebrate all that makes us Kehoe-France!</li> </ul>					
Recess & Playground Equipment	<ul> <li>We feel that recess will be more important than ever, and students of all age groups w receive their regularly scheduled amount of recess time.</li> <li>A recess schedule and map will be provided to staff and strictly adhered to by teachers</li> <li>Each classroom will have a designated area for outside play, and students will not interact with students from other groupings.</li> <li>The only exception to this will be in Plan C, with an extended period of time for the community spent in Phase 3. Administration will determine when and if it is appropriat for groups to mix during recess and break times.</li> <li>Playground equipment will be wiped down by maintenance staff between groups durin the day.</li> </ul>					
Drinks, Snacks, Lunch	<ul> <li>Students in preschool through seventh grade should all bring a water bottle to school each day labeled with their first and last name, and ideally their homeroom as well.</li> <li>Water fountains cannot be used, and there will be refillable water stations for use instead.</li> <li>Water bottles should ideally not have exposed straws.</li> <li>Students in Children Center groups through second grade must purchase the snack program from Healthy Course Catering, or they must bring a packed snack each day from home. \*\*Plan D will involve a return to "normal" schedules, policies, and protocols as followed pre-pandemic. It may be determined that some health and safety measures are best continued in practice.

### D. Dealing with a COVID-19 Infection or Exposure

#### Health Scenario #1:

A staff member or student has a confirmed case of COVID-19.

#### Steps for Families & School:

- Immediately contact child's school nurse, homeroom teacher, and division principal.
- Families in the impacted group will be notified, while still maintaining confidentiality of the individual.
- All families will be made aware there is a COVID-19 case on campus.
- The Regional Health Director will be contacted.
- The classroom and any other area of the school used by the impacted group will be shut down for cleaning.
- All staff and students of the impacted room must remain at home in quarantine for 14 days.
- Any siblings or children of the individual who tests positive for COVID-19 must also remain at home for 14 days.

• Symptoms of COVID-19 as defined by the CDC: fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea.

#### **Requirements for Return:**

- For individuals in the group who do not demonstrate symptoms during quarantine, he/she may return at the conclusion of 14 days.
- For individuals in the group who develop symptoms, he/she should be tested for COVID-19 and/or have a doctor's note to return and meet all the criteria before returning to campus:
  - o A minimum of 24 hours without fever, and without the use of fever-reducing medication
  - All symptoms have improved (please see list provided above)
  - o 10 days have passed since symptoms first appeared
- For any individual testing positive for COVID-19, he/she must be tested for COVID-19 and/or have a doctor's note to return and meet all the following criteria before returning to campus:
  - A minimum of 24 hours without fever, and without the use of fever-reducing medication
  - All symptoms have improved (please see list provided above)
  - o 10 days have passed since symptoms first appeared

#### Health Scenario #2:

A staff member or student has prolonged exposure and close contact as defined by CDC guidelines with a person outside of school who tests positive for COVID-19.

- Immediately contact school nurse, homeroom teacher, and division principal.
- Enter a 14-day self-quarantine.
- If a staff member or student develops symptoms of illness after an exposure to COVID-19, then the individual will be viewed by the school as a presumptive positive case and we will follow the protocols outlined above in Scenario #1.
- See above for guidance upon returning to campus.

#### Health Scenario #3:

Staff/Student exhibit symptoms of COVID-19 without positive diagnosis or known exposure.

- Individual must isolate at home and should visit a doctor to determine the cause of symptoms. Individuals with symptoms identified in carpool will be sent home, but other students in the car who can pass the health assessment (including no known exposures to COVID-19) will be allowed onto campus.
- If fever that persists for greater than 48 hours, then individual should schedule an appointment with a doctor.
- If deemed necessary by medical professional, individual tested for COVID-19 and share results with school.
- If COVID-19 test is positive, please follow protocol listed above for positive case.
- If COVID-19 test is negative, the individual must be fever free for 48 hours and free of all other symptoms of illness for a minimum of 24 hours.

#### **Health Scenario #4:**

Exposure during distance learning.

- We make the request that even in times of distance learning, you contact your division principal regarding any direct exposures or infections impacting your student and/or family.
- Having this information will not only help us to better serve your child(ren) during distance learning but will also help us to facilitate a safe return to campus for all, should we move to a new plan.

### **B. Educational Delivery**

#### a. Lower School

- All homerooms will have a SeeSaw classroom created to use for in-person and at-home activities and instruction and established at the start of the school year.
- Specialists will each create a SeeSaw classroom, but it will only be necessary for students to access the specialists assigned to their pod at any given point. SeeSaw for Schools is set-up to allow a student to login and see all of his/her classes at the same time, so there will no longer be the need to log in and out of each class using different QR codes.
- Families can use a personal device to engage with online learning. The school will supplement with devices to the students in grade levels with required virtual coursework to the maximum extent possible.

#### b. Upper School

- All homerooms will have a Google Classroom created to use for in-person and at-home activities and instruction and established at the start of the school year.
- Specialists in first through fourth grade will create Google Classrooms for students based on the pod schedule.
- Specialists in fifth through seventh grade will create Google Classrooms for all students in middle school.
- Families in first through fourth grade will be able to use a personal device of their choosing to engage with online learning. The school will supplement with devices to the maximum extent possible using the same process as the 2019-2020 school year during fourth quarter distance learning.
- Students in fifth through seventh grade will be issued an iPad for the school year to be used for in-school and at-home instruction.

#### c. Virtual Learning

- Virtual teacher will create a SeeSaw or Google Classroom for each grade level for students enrolled in this program. Students in the same grade level will belong to the same Google Classroom or SeeSaw class.
- Virtual teacher will post all content necessary for all subject areas to this one classroom.
- Families in PK-4 through 4th grade can use a personal device of their choosing for online learning, and the school will supplement with devices to the maximum extent possible.
- Students in 5th through 7th grade who are enrolled in virtual learning will still be issued a school iPad for the year.

#### **C. Attendance**

- Those students selecting in-person instruction or virtual school for the 2020-2021 school year will be held to the same attendance regulations as outlined in our Family Handbook, as well as the information shared in the Virtual Learning Handbook.
- Teachers will be taking attendance during in-person and/or online sessions of school.
- Quarantine days will not be specifically counted toward a student's absence totals, but students must also continue to be present in virtual classes in order to avoid being marked absent.

- While we must maintain attendance regulations, we also want to reiterate that we do not want students to attend school if they are experiencing symptoms of illness. Additionally, we know that COVID-19 is creating a multitude of hardships for our families. As is always our school policy, administration reserves the right to coordinate the handling of any extended absences for a student.
- Kehoe-France does not give any awards, prizes, or other recognition regarding a student's attendance.

### E. Social and Emotional Support

While we work to address the academic needs of our students as we re-open, the social and emotional support of our students is a top priority. Students need to feel safe both physically and psychologically to engage in school, and we will work hard to establish that sense of safety. Our school counselor will work with faculty, parents and outside community members to provide social and emotional support to students and families.

- Facilitated classroom meetings with the school counselor in the first few weeks of school to collectively process the experience. This may need to occur more than once depending on the needs of each class.
- Individual counseling The school counselor will meet individually with students in need.
  - Students can self-refer, or a parent or faculty member may request that a student meet with the counselor.
    - The school counselor may administer informal social and emotional screenings throughout the year to help identify students who may be struggling.
  - Counseling will be available to students enrolled in virtual learning or if we are engaged in distance learning.
- Informal Check-Ins
  - Some students may need a quick, informal weekly check-in. The counselor will work with faculty, parents and students to determine who may benefit from this.
- Parent Support
  - The school counselor will be available to meet with parents virtually for support and parent coaching.
- Referrals/Wellness Resources
  - Our school counselor is available to provide information on outside providers if necessary, many of whom are familiar with Kehoe-France.
  - Counseling Corner in the newsletter.
- COVID-19 Protective Measures
  - The school counselor will have one student at a time in her office. If the counselor needs to meet with more than one student, she will find a space (i.e., conference room, outside) where the group can meet and be socially distanced.
  - The school counselor will wear a mask or face shield while meeting with students.
  - The counseling office will be cleaned after each visitor.

## **Part IV. Additional Programs**

### A. Athletics

For the reopening of the Kehoe-France 2020-2021 school year, we will be delaying the start of fall sports until after Labor Day. We want to focus on having the safest reopening possible, which means time to help establish these new protocols and make students comfortable with everything as well as the return to the classroom. Kehoe-France will stay in communication with other schools in the NOAL, as well as other independent schools in order to best determine the path forward.

We will commence with our fall sports seasons with interscholastic boys' flag football, girls' volleyball, and co-ed cross country teams. Swimming will be an intramural program only this fall. Interscholastic teams will be limited to students in fifth-seventh grade. When possible, fourth grade students will be integrated into intramural programs. Information regarding health and safety protocols for coaches and student-athletes will be communicated from the school's athletic department. Parents will need to provide permission for their child(ren) to participate in athletics and understanding that any athletic team is an additional cohort of students to which your child will be exposed. All quarantine protocols outlined above in the health scenarios will be followed for athletic teams as well.

If it is determined during any athletic season of the school year that we cannot safely participate in interscholastic competition, then we will work to build a robust intramural program that persists with our health and safety protocols carried throughout the school day.

### **B. Activities**

Activities may include (but are not limited to) Band, Choir, Scouts, musical performances/plays, Arts A Go Go, Chess Club, Soccer Shots, and Makerspace Camp. In following with the same decision as athletics, we will be delaying the beginning of any such activities until after the Labor Day weekend. Once again, this will allow us time to assess the health situation in our community, the reopening of school and which plan of teaching and learning we are currently enacting, and to determine the safest way forward with such activities. For parents who are responsible for leading a Scout troop for our girls or boys, we want to encourage the use of virtual meetings to begin the school year. Further protocol regarding the use of campus for Scout meetings will follow after Labor Day as well.

In accordance with guidelines, our vocal music students may sing indoors for certain events or occasions with Ms. Elaine Frost. When singing indoors, students will continue to wear their masks and will be socially distanced from one another. Otherwise, Ms. Frost will continue to take students outdoors for singing as a part of her class. For Mr. Mike Hotstream's band program, the students will be able to begin using wind-blown instruments. Instruments will not be shared between students, and students will be socially distanced from one another while playing. Students will wear a mask in Band at all other times when not actively playing a wind-blown instrument. Students will continue to remain in their same static groups for both of these classes as well. We are also already working to reimagine our first through fourth grade and middle school plays, as the normal planning of such events would require mixing of student groups, many external visitors to campus, and a large

gathering for the actual performance. Once again, however, we want to reassure everyone that we will certainly be carrying forward with these traditions, but they may need to be somewhat altered in order to be done safely and in such a manner that prioritizes minimizing community spread and keeping students in school.

#### C. Before & After Care

Due to our morning arrival procedures and in addition the restrictions involving static groups, we will not be able to offer Before Care at this time. The only exception to this may be in the Little Pioneer house which is in isolated buildings and can potentially be opened for 7:00 a.m. should there be an identified need. More information will be provided to Little Pioneer families in the coming days.

We are currently working through the survey results and attempting to work with our class lists in order to provide an After Care program while maintaining our same cohorts and following the same health and safety protocols from the school day. More information will be provided to all families in the coming days as well.
